The Saraswat Khatri Pathshala Society runs the college, exercises its control over policy making for the college, through Governing Body, with the Principal as one of its ex-officio members.

The Principal functions through Co-ordinators of various streams, PIO, Bursar, DSW and other important officials, which meets weekly. This expands into the IQAC, which does the planning and evaluation for the college and meets quarterly. Various committees of staff and students take responsibility for the different activities of the college. At the department level, HODs are encouraged to hold meetings periodically and bring points for discussion to the Heads meeting with Principal which is held every month.
